







People are more than

Two years of COVID, a contentious election and a subsequent year of extreme partisanship have undermined Americans trust in major institutions.





A similar phenomenon occurs in trust of the House of Representatives, with 50% having a degree of less trust as opposed to 16% who have more.



While the disparity isn't nearly as great as it is at the federal level a diminished trust in local government has also occurred with 36% less trusting, while 24% have more trust.


Trust level change in the past two years: Local government






The phenomena is not unique to the government sector either. Despite the successful development, production and distribution of COVID vaccines respondents are more likely (40%) to be less trusting than more trusting (27%) of the pharmaceutical industry.

Trust level change in the past two years: Pharmaceutical companies





Trust level change in the past two years: Big companies in general




The first category we see respondents displaying greater trust is online-only retailers. 29% are somewhat or much more trusting than two years ago while only 19% have experienced a trust decline.






The data for mass merchant retailers is nearly identical to that of their online counterparts. 29% of respondents are more trusting while only 18% are less so.


Most Trustworthy News Sources

Conversely, only OAN (41%) was identified among the three least trustworthy sources by more than 2 people in 5.






Listed below are the news sources you did not select in the prior question.






If you had to choose one of the following as your only source for news, which would you choose?




Concern about the Omicron variant has not changed significantly in the past 4 weeks despite how quickly it has spread across the U.S.

More than two-thirds of respondents (68%) feel schools should shut down if they experience a significant Omicron outbreak.


% Who think schools should shut down for Omicron variant



Do you think schools should be shut down if there is a significant COVID outbreak caused by the Omicron variant?


Fewer than half the respondents report living in a community that currently has a mask mandate. 9% admit to not knowing the regulations in their community.

% Of those who's community hasn't issued a mask mandate who think they should




Do you think your community should implement a mask mandate?



61% of respondents feel large gatherings like sporting events, concerts, etc. should be canceled because of Omicron.


% Who think should large gatherings be canceled because of Omicron

Trust in Institutions

 less trust in the U.S. Senate than to have greater trust.
